'Feeding the Souls of the Community'

Located at 450 Jarrott Street, Manna House is a community soup kitchen and food pantry supporting the unity and health of the community with love and spiritual blessings, providing nutritious free meals and food for families in Florence.

Under the direction of Melinda Waddell, Manna House serves over 5,200 meals monthly. Additionally, more than 550 families receive groceries through their pantry. The "Manna Wheels" program serves meals three (3) days/week to 118 homebound seniors and disabled seniors and veterans.

The demand for services at Manna House is on the rise for numerous reasons including: the decrease in SNAP benefits available to their clients and the increase in the homeless population they serve. In June, 45 percent of those served were homeless, largely because of the lack of affordable housing in our area.

Manna House is always in need of donations and volunteers. Suggested pantry item donations include: bottled water, granola bars, fruit cups, pop-top entrees, peanut butter, jelly, canned chicken and tuna, and travel-sized hygiene products for women and men. The Wilderness of Fear

Dear Church Family,

The greatest commandment is, "To love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your mind, all your soul and all your strength." Yet, the most repeated command is, "Do not be afraid." …Does that strike you? The scriptures often quote God as saying, "Do not be afraid, for I am with you."

Since this is the most oft-repeated command, surely it applies to all of us. It is very common for us humans to be afraid. Yet, since God is the Almighty, shouldn't His children be the very last ones on earth who would fear? If God is with you, who can be against you? If God is with you, should not that mean by very definition there is no reason to be afraid? Should not the people of God be the most secure – the least afraid – out of all the people of the earth? Yet, there it is again and again: "So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand" (Isaiah 41:10).

What are you afraid of? ... An unknown future? Of failing? Of a lack of control? Of being powerless? Or all alone?

Above the fireplace in the living room in my home is a painting titled, "Streams of Living Water." A Christian painted it based on Isaiah 43:19, "See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland." (See the photograph of the painting, nearby.) I like having it in the middle of the living room because God meets us right in the middle of our living. He meets us in the desert – in the wilderness times of life – and He can take what is barren and make it fruitful. God can take what is dead and make it flourish.

The last thing we want when we are wandering in the Wilderness of Fear is to be alone. This is why it is powerful to visit someone in the hospital and to hold their hand. Or to be connected in a small group, with a mentor, or be in a discipling relationship in which we are truly known and meet regularly face-to-face.



It takes maturity not to protect one's image and be vulnerable, yet the fullness of life that it yields is astounding. The only reason that we are able to do this is because of Jesus, our Immanuel – our "God with us." And it is precisely being in relationship with others in which we become more aware of the God who is with us. "Wherever two or more are gathered in my name, there I am in their midst" (Matthew 18:20).

Please keep our church officers and strategic planning in your prayers as we are making good progress. We are particularly focusing in on avenues of discipleship, such as the Men's Retreat Aug 18-20. We desire to be disciples and make disciples who do not fear because we live with our God. We want to walk together in the dry, dusty Wilderness of Fear until living waters spring forth.

Also, I have one piece of good news: so much delight has been expressed by so many covenant partners over the one summer worship service that we will continue one service at 10 a.m. through September 3. Summer Sunday School will continue "as is." Two services will resume after Labor Day on September 10.

Finding Your Identity

"Mirror, mirror on the wall, who's the fairest of them all..." You remember those words of the Evil Queen in Snow White. And all of us familiar with the story would say, "It wasn't her!"

Let me ask you an important question, "What 'mirror' do you use to clearly see and to realistically identify yourself?"

Far too many of us are slaves to the opinions of other people about us. Like starving beggars, we hang onto any word or gesture of affirmation from these "important" people in our lives. It could be a co-worker, a friend, a classmate, or someone we long to be like. But in our minds, these people's verdicts carry enormous weight on how we see ourselves.

For others of us our identity is shaped by what we do. Our vocation is critical not only in providing a paycheck but also it "validates" us. If we're successful in our work, then we feel like somebody.

And still others of us build our self-worth upon our "net worth." What we drive, where we live, how we dress, where we belong are critical markers for determining "who we are." Those of us in this category live by the mantra, "If I can buy the right things, then I am a worthy person."

How do we discover the TRUTH about ourselves in a "world of spin" that proclaims, "You are your physical image" ... "You are what others say about you..." "You are what you possess..."?

Reality ... the reality of your identity is found in what God says about you. The truth of God's Word is the very DNA of your true self. What does God say about you?

Listen to what the Lord says about you, **You have made** us a little less than God and crowned us with glory and honor. (Psalm 8:5) Elsewhere God says, I have called you by name, you are Mine. (Isaiah 43:1)



Let those words sink deeply into your soul. Let them resonate in the innermost part of your very being. May they powerfully shape your view of yourself. Only when you look to Jesus Christ ... only when you allow God's Word to be your "mirror" will you see yourself clearly.

Have you heard of the "Looking Glass Self Theory"? It basically states, "a person gets his identity in life based on how the most important person in his life sees him." Jesus Christ looks at you and says, "I love you unconditionally." "I gave my life for you so that you might have life in all its fullness."

Toward a Healthier Church

I recently did a Google search using "definitions of generosity." The search generated a number of results, but I was drawn to one in particular: "What is the true meaning of generosity?" When I clicked this link, I was taken to a webpage titled **Generosity for Life** (<u>https://generosityforlife.org/</u>). I found a number of interesting statements on the subject of generosity and want to share a few of them with you:

- Generosity *is* a learned character trait that involves both attitude and action — entailing as a virtue both an inclination or predilection to give liberally and an actual practice of giving liberally.
- Generosity <u>is not</u> a random idea or haphazard behavior but rather, <u>in its mature form, a basic,</u> <u>personal, moral orientation to life</u>. Furthermore, in a world of moral contrasts, generosity entails not only the moral good expressed but also many vices rejected (selfishness, greed, fear, meanness).
- Generosity also involves giving to others not simply anything in abundance but rather giving those things that are good for others. Generosity always intends to enhance the true wellbeing of those to whom it gives.

Generosity is a theme that runs throughout scripture. We see it in both the Old and New Testament. While looking at the statements about generosity on the *Generosity for Life* website, I was reminded of Paul's words on generosity to the Corinthians:

"The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully[a] will also reap bountifully. ⁷Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." (2 Corinthians 9:6-7)

These verses summarize the statements about generosity listed above. They also serve as a challenge to each of us as we consider how we are to respond to God's call on our life with regard to generosity. Generosity is a learned character trait involving attitude and action. It's not enough to "think" about being generous, we have to "do" generous. Generosity is foundational to our discipleship. "Paul regarded generosity as a proof of the genuine character of Christian love. For Paul, this love is exemplified by Christ who, "though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor" (2 Corinthians 8:9) (<u>www.generosityresearch.nd.edu</u>). Finally, we are called to love our neighbors as ourselves, generosity should be motivated by love for our neighbors. First Presbyterian Church is a generous family of faith with covenant partners who give their time, talent and treasure to support the mission and ministry that we have been called to in our community.

Columbarium Memory Garden

This section is for the remembrance of covenant partners, their spouses, children, as well as the parents of covenant partners, who are deceased and are interred elsewhere. We have filled two panels and are working on a third one. Each panel contains eight (8) names. Currently we have three names — meaning that we need five more to fill out the panel. The "In Memoriam" is another way to remember those who meant so much and are no longer with us. Many of our covenant partners may not be aware of this way to memorialize a beloved family member.
