
'Mind Blown'

Dear Church Family,

Jesus began His public ministry by proclaiming, "Repent and believe the Gospel" (Mark 1:15).

The word "repent" is from the Greek word "metanoia." While often translated as "repent," the word "meta" is a preposition that means "with" and "noia" refers to the life of the mind (as in "noetic"). Thus, when someone "repents and believes" it is a complete life change. They re-think everything about life: How we see meaning, purpose, and what is of value changes completely. One's basic orientation to the world is completely reconsidered. One definition of metanoia reads, "to change any or all of the elements composing one's life: attitude, thoughts, and behaviors concerning the demands of God for right living."

Author Alan Hirsch likes to emphasize this reorientation and re-thinking for the people of God by translating "metanoia" as "mind blown." His recent book



Metanoia sets the theme for our ECO National Gathering at FPC-Greenville, S.C., Jan 29-31. Simply put, given that the American Church is following in the footsteps of the tremendous state of the decline in the European Church, Metanoia helps us live into God's future afresh. It is a call for the Church to wake up and change in hopes of changing its current trajectory.

At the ECO National Gathering, in addition to seeing old friends, making new friendships, having fun (such as riding the mechanical bull in Texas, or enjoying the luau in California), and stellar worship, the teaching options are always excellent. Peruse the National Gathering website (econationalgathering.org), and you will see there are four breakout sessions: two on Monday, and two on Tuesday. Each day, one breakout session is before lunch at 11 a.m., and one is after lunch (1:30 or 2:30 p.m.). Each of these four breakout sessions has 10-12 different options. That is incredible. ECO offers many resources to be lifelong learners who are repeatedly challenged to have their mind blown.

The seminars include areas such as: discipleship and evangelism, church transformation, theology, church business and finance, leadership development, global engagement, church planting, engaging cultural issues, creative arts and worship, youth, and children/family/ youth. ... Interested? These sessions are taught by a great variety of practitioners and prominent teachers. Here are a mere six of the sessions being offered:

- Children/Family/Youth: Get Families in Your Doors and Keep Them: Learn strategies and practical ideas for reaching, welcoming, and embracing families.
- Discipleship & Evangelism: Discipleship Essentials: Discipleship is at the heart of what it means to be a Christian, yet many struggle. If you want to grow, join us to learn more.
- Engaging Cultural Issues: From Cheap Reconciliation to Racial Justice
- **Leadership Development:** Flourish Institute of Theology (FIT) Update - Learn about our redesigned seminary for the 21st century. Includes a time for Q&A.
- **Theology:** Gender, Sex, and the Church A quick overview, including ideas for pastoral care and church leadership.
- **Creative Arts / Worship:** Developing a Strategy for Your Worship Ministry

Our congregation has been a leader in ECO since its inception. I urge you to sign up and come spend a few hours in Greenville on either Monday, Jan. 29, or Tuesday, Jan. 30. You will have a fine taste of the ethos of ECO. I cannot imagine walking away and not feeling refreshed or excited. If a number of us go and take different sessions and come back and share, it would be a blessing to Florence. This teaching and the renewing of the mind will help us to live out our vision: "First Presbyterian Church Florence will be a community of Christ Followers committed to being disciples and making disciples in the way of Jesus."

Finding Balance for Life


There is a time for EVERYTHING... (Eccl 3:1)

As you read this column, I want you to think about one key concept — BALANCE. Balance is critical to most every activity in which we engage. Even though I coached high school wrestling, I was not a good wrestler. But I remember my first commandment of wrestling, "Keep your balance." As a wrestler whenever you lose your balance or your weight is not evenly distributed, your weight becomes your adversary, and you will get pinned!

I'm not a good golfer, but I'm learning that when I swing at a golf ball and end up with my body falling away from the ball that the result is UGLY (that's right capital letters...ugly). Need I go on to talk about baseball "failings" and basketball "airballs" and tennis "miss hits"?!

What's basic to sports is foundational to life. Balance is the key. Let me try to paint the picture in words.

- When you (me, you, and the rest of us reading this column) finish the church meeting, make a couple of calls in the car on your way home, and get in after the kids are in bed and the dinner is cold ... you're out of balance.
- When you have strained to keep up with the workload and on Saturday evening you sneak on the computer to finish a few more tasks ... you're out of balance.
- When you're sitting on the porch with your spouse as they are catching you up on an encounter which he/she had with a friend and suddenly you hear, "Are you listening to me? Your eyes are shut!" ... you're out of balance.
- When you've diligently kept your commitment to the gym and realized it's been days since you've read a Word from the Lord or spoken a word to the Lord... you're out of balance.
- When the people closest to you get "leftovers" from you while others at work, church, or the ballfield get your kindness and full attention ... you're out of balance.



Please note these people and activities are "good things." But as Paul David Tripp reminds us in his book, *Lead*, balance is lost when "good things become ruling things." So, my questions to you are: "How's your balance?" "Are you living your life in such a way that you are maintaining a posture of strength?"

As this Advent season meets us, let's remember this vital truth found in I Cor 3:11, For no one can lay any other foundation other than the one already laid, which is Jesus Christ.

Keep that "Foundation" and you will maintain "balance" for life.

2024 Stewardship Campaign

We tend to associate the word stewardship with giving money. The truth is that it is about so much more. Rightly understood, stewardship is about **giving** our time talent and treasure in obedience to God's calling on our lives. Last month many of you gave time and talent by your involvement with SERVFLO. During the month of November, we will be challenged on the importance of stewardship and our growth as disciples. As part of our worship during the month of November, we will hear from our covenant partners about why they pledge. This year we will hear from Cookie Cawthon, Executive Director of Tenacious Grace. Cookie will share how God has and continues to use First Presbyterian Church to minister to the women who come through their program. ...

Later this month, all covenant partners will receive a letter from the Enabling Unit of the Session regarding our 2024 Stewardship Campaign. The letter will include **2024 Commitment** cards, which will allow you to make a pledge to financially support the ministry and mission of First Presbyterian Church. If preferred, covenant partners may also make a pledge using REALM or by using the MAKE A PLEDGE link located at the top of the First Presbyterian Church homepage. Our campaign will culminate with Commitment Sunday on November 19.

The **2024 Commitment** card will look a little different that those from previous years. Many of us are visual learners and pictures, diagrams and graphs help us grasp ideas and concepts. On the back of the card there is a chart designed to help each of us understand what our individual giving level looks like in comparison to a tithe (10%). The chart has ranges of weekly giving (Lower, Middle, Upper, Tithe (10%) and Beyond a Tithe) for various income levels. My prayer is that you use this as a tool to prayerfully consider how we can follow the call of God found in Malachi 3:10

"Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. Test me in this," says the LORD Almighty, "and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that you will not have room enough for it."



There is much going on in our community, our country and the world that is creating a heightened level of anxiety and uncertainty for many. Philippians 4:6-7 is one of my favorite verses. Paul writes: Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your *minds in Christ Jesus*. Philippians 4:6-7 is one of many verses that assures us of God's presence, regardless of the circumstances we face. In his letter to the church at Corinth, Paul writes: "Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." (2 Corinthians 9:7) As we look to the future, I want to encourage all covenant partners to look at how God has blessed you and ask Him how He wants you to use your time, talent, and treasure to be a blessing to others through the work of First Presbyterian Church.

Blessings are Bountiful

November is here. A time to pause and be thankful for the blessings of this life.

As we move forward into November, the 3K and 4K classes will be busy getting ready for their annual Thanks-Lunch, which will be held in early November in the CLC. Each child will invite their parents and others to join them for lunch at school on this special day. Before the luncheon the children will help prepare stone soup to be served at the lunch. We begin this activity by telling the story of stone soup. In the story, two soldiers are walking home from the war. They arrive at a small town, where they go from door to door asking the villagers for something to eat. After no luck they eventually settle in the town square, where they build a small fire and place a big pot of water over it and a large stone. As each villager comes by, a soldier stirs the water and remarks how good it would taste if they only had one onion or one carrot, one potato, a soup bone, etc. With each addition from a villager, the soup really does begin to smell hearty and soon there is enough soup to feed the whole town. During our stone soup activity, each child will bring one vegetable to school and will help prepare it for the soup. This is an excellent lesson in sharing and is an activity that is enjoyed each year.

Learning to share is a lesson which will affect our children for the rest of their lives. Young children learn sharing by practicing taking turns to play with a favorite toy or learning to wait their turn for an activity. When one comes to realize that there are others in this world besides themselves, they are beginning to learn the concept of sharing. Working together we can meet the needs of all involved.

Early each morning the CDC preschool classes meet in the hallway outside of the Fellowship Hall and have a time of prayer. This is quick check in and good morning time. We always include a short prayer offered by one of our CDC Staff. It is important for adults to model thankfulness for young children. We are thankful to

God for many things and children learn as they listen to us express ourselves to a living God.

Florence Turkey Trot benefits Poetice International

In 1896, the first Turkey Trot was held at a YMCA in Buffalo, New York. It was a 5-mile course, and every year since, that Turkey Trot has been held. In fact, it's the oldest continuous footrace in North America. Since 1896, not only has the Turkey Trot in Buffalo grown in participants — capping at 14,000 — but also the popularity of such races blossomed across the East Coast and across the nation.

The craze hit South Carolina — Charleston's was established in 1914. Most cities have picked up the tradition of getting an exercise in before the holiday feast. More than 11 years ago, Covenant Partner Stephen Thompson took the initiative when a couple events aligned. First, a friend of his with festivals and promotions in Myrtle Beach talked with him about Thanksgiving being the biggest 5K race day in the country and Florence didn't have one. Second, Stephen and his wife, Alison, were in a small group at church with Jeremy and Courtney Emert, who were readying to become missionaries. Stephen took the call to be the Florence race organizer and made the Emerts the beneficaries so Jeremy would receive funds to help work with women who were abused and teaching them how to sew. The Emerts, with Poetice International, have worked for Poetice in Zambia since 2014. Jeremy is a pastor and is in Houses Oversight and Development. Courtney is Worship Team Lead.

"What a blessing it has been to our family and ministry to have the support of the annual Thanksgiving Turkey Trotters for the last 10 years," Courtney said. "The hard work and commitment of the event's sponsors and participants encourage us and spur us on to continue the work that God's called us to in Zambia, Africa! Blessings on this year's event!"

"We have a good community of people doing it every year," said Stephen, who co-owns Local Motive in Florence. "There's out of town folks in to see family and runners of all skill sets – from Clemson University cross country team members to parents with strollers to walkers – that have participated."

Stephen said the race has grown over the years. The first year they partnered with House of Hope and had a 5K and 10K, and they had a hundred people race. Since then it's been a 5K and growing in numbers — last year they had a few hundred participants.

Among the dedicated volunteers, the timing team, the company that helps put the race together, and the Briggs Elementary School and neighborhood folks, the race is a success. It's gaining a lot of momentum, Stephen said. "It gives me confidence to put it on this year and years to follow."
