The Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) is pleased to have this space to share our updates with you. Since the report in the Reminder last month, much has taken place. I will not unduly repeat its information but would like to both contextualize and highlight from it.

The PNC essentially functions like a small group. We dedicate time at each meeting to discuss Scripture and other readings, to pray together, and to engage in conversation. In that spirit, we diligently now seek that pastor who would be our next Head of Staff. The work of the PNC in laying the spiritual groundwork has allowed us to quickly "go to press" with ECO. Our ever-faithful fellow traveler and advisor from the Presbytery of South Carolina, Blake Taylor, and our consultant advisors from Knot Navigators, Bill Enns and Dori Little, have all remarked upon the alacrity with which this process has proceeded thus far. Praise be to God for that!

Now is not the time to relent. Now is not the time to relax. Now is not the time to dissipate the preparation and work to date.

Now, in fact, is the time to re-double prayer. Now, in fact, is the time to straighten the way in our own relationships, commitments, participation, and stewardship sacrifices to His Works facilitated and furthered by our local church mission and its programs.

We have gone to the "Job Board." We are posted. Potential candidates for our church pastor call are looking. It is no longer something theoretical for the future. It is at hand. Please pray with us and for our work as the PNC. Please rededicate yourself to this new chapter in the life of our church. As we call, so must we ready ourselves also to be called.

What Does It Mean to be Generous?

The word "generous" is often defined as: open in giving or sharing; willing to give help or support; unselfish. Generous living is not a concept limited to the wealthy, the gifted, or the lucky. Generosity is a lifestyle that stems from a desire to worship God in every area of life

The principle of generosity is laced all throughout Scripture, and we have the best model and mentor when it comes to seeing it in action — God. He sent His Son, Jesus, as a sacrifice for our mistakes so that way we could spend eternity with Him. That is generosity in action.

Psalm 24:1 says that "the earth is the LORD's and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it. ..." Everything we have belongs to God and is given to us by Him. He is the owner, and we are His managers. And the people who manage well are often entrusted with more to manage. It doesn't matter how much we have; it matters what we do with what we're given.

We will live generously when we view everything we have as a gift from God. And when we do that, our mindsets switch from "This is mine?" to "How can I share?" So, right now, think about how you view the things God has given you. Do you see them as gifts from God to be shared, or as accomplishments and possessions you've earned? What is one thing you can start doing today to become more generous?

Facts & Figures

Our **2025 Ministry Action Plan** is approximately \$1.93 million. This is a challenging budget, however, based on a strong response to our 2025 Stewardship campaign last fall and forecast non-pledge giving numbers, the Session felt confident that it is attainable. With that said, the first few months of 2025 have been up and down, which is a typical pattern for this time of the year. To carry out the *Ministry Action Plan* set forth by our pastors, program staff and the various ministry units of the Session, we need to receive contributions of \$37,320 per week. Through mid-May, the average weekly giving is approximately \$5,000 below the average weekly amount needed. Again, while this is a typical pattern for this time of year, it is important that we not become complacent.

We are entering the summer months, and we will see many of our covenant partners heading off for summer trips and vacations. We also will see an increase in expenses as our children's and youth ministry activities ramp up for the summer.

The good news is that, thanks to the continued faithful support of our covenant partners, we are current in our support of our missionaries and commitments to the local helping organizations that we support.

As we move into the summer months, let me encourage you to include continued financial support of the ministries and mission of First Presbyterian Church in your summer plans. One way that you can do this is through online giving, which allows you to support the ministries of our church even when you are away. 

Practical Living in the Church

Ephesians 4:1-16

In the first three chapters of Ephesians the plan of God for the churches is charted. In the final three chapters, the way the Christians in the first century church are to live in community is detailed. We can think of Ephesians chapters 4-6 as guidelines for living. Ephesians 4:1-16 perform as a transition from the purpose of the Church to the fulfilling of that purpose. This section is bracketed by two sayings that explain how a Christian is to live. First, the Christian is called "to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called (Ephesians 4:1)." Four times in the Pauline letters does this phrase occur to explain the purpose of life: in Philippians 1:27, "only let your manner of life be worthy of the gospel of Christ"; in Colossians 1:10, "to lead a life worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him"; and in I Thessalonians 2:12, "to lead a life worthy of God, who calls you into his kingdom and glory." Second, in Ephesians 4:15, Christians are called to speak "the truth in love" and to grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ." These two sayings summarize the complete purpose of how a person is to serve God in the world. We seek to lead a worthy life depending on the Holy Spirit leading us to maturity as a disciple of Jesus. In beautiful language, the virtues similar to the fruit of the Spirit in Galatians 5 are listed. There are four virtues listed in Ephesians: humility, patience, loving one another, and unity of the Spirit. Beginning at verse 4 is a creed expressing what is meant by unity. The creed has a rhythm of one. The word one is repeated seven times indicating that the Church is unified in a Trinity composed of Spirit, the Lord Iesus Christ, and God the Father. The various denominations of Christianity need to study and verify what is believed in common. The Church is founded by the Spirit of our Lord Jesus. The Church practices faith in Jesus and the LORD God. The Church baptizes as a sign that a person belongs to God. Even though baptism has produced controversy between denominations, baptism is required to participate in the eucharist, the Lord's Supper. Every Church identifies in the one hope of reconciliation at our resurrection to God the Creator.

Ephesians 4:7 is best understood to refer to the gift of the Holy Spirit given at Pentecost. "But grace was



given to each of us according to the measure of Christ's gift." Psalm 68:18 is used to show God always has had a plan to give humans the gifts to build the Church on earth. It is the gifts (grace) of Christ that are given to each person. The words for grace and gift are the same (xaris). I believe ambiguity is used here to show that whatever the Church needs to mature has been received. A reference is made to Psalm 68:18 in which the LORD gifts the people. I believe that because Christ gives these gifts to the Church, he descends to earth at Pentecost with the Spirit to birth the Church. Christ in the Spirit gave the gifts to the Church with the Spirit. A listing of the early organizations of the Church is given to do three things for the Church, first to equip the Church, second to equip the Church for the work of ministry and third to build the body. All these gifts are given to attain unity. The maturity of individuals and the leadership is the goal of God the Father, the Christ and the Holy Spirit. With these gifts the Christians as the Church are now ready to undertake the work of reconciliation in the world.

The Women in Ministry's Spring Celebration highlighted faith, friendships, and ministry on May 6 with the presentation of the Life Service Award and guest speaker Julie Knox with Operation Mobilisation.

Jan Green received the Life Service Award. Her faithfulness to the young and old, Keenagers, as well as the women of the church matches the energy in which she keeps in step with the Spirit. Throughout the years teaching at First Presbyterian Church, Jan has taught third- and fourth-graders during Sunday School and has mentored many Confirmands for their next steps in their spiritual journey.

As previous receipient Betsy Olsen said in introducing Jan, "She is a true spiritual leader in our church. ... She empties herself to become what is required."

Julie Knox spoke about OM's mission to see vibrant communities of Jesus-followers among the least reached. Julie is a former journalist for the British Broadcasting Corporation BBC whom God called to leave her career as a war reporter to bring the news of how He is at work around the world. OM's international mission movement was started almost 70 years ago by three American students who were passionate that everyone in the world should have the opportunity to hear the gospel at least once. OM now has more than 5,000 workers representing over 130 nationalities engaged in a range of creative ministries — which are supplied with Christian literature from a base in Florence. There are some moments in ministry that stay with you — and Children's Sunday was one of those moments.

On Mother's Day, our children stood before the congregation and led worship with such boldness, heart, and joy. Whether they were reading Scripture, acting out the story of Noah's Ark, or offering prayers for God's people, they reminded all of us what it looks like to follow Jesus with childlike faith. One of the most meaningful moments of the service, in my opinion, was the Prayer for God's People. What made it so powerful was that the children came up with it themselves — every name, every cause, every person and place came straight from their hearts.

During the planning stages, when I asked the children who and what they wanted to include in the prayer, I was astounded by the number of people and causes they named. Honestly, I thought it might be too much — that we'd need to trim the list. But then I paused and realized how beautiful it is that these children pray with such trust in God — believing there is no limit to what they can bring before Him. Their faith doesn't hesitate. To them, there's no such thing as too much to ask of God.

The skit they performed told the story of Noah's Ark, pointing us to our theme of "Trusting in God." Noah trusted when no one else did. And through that trust, God saved him — not just for that moment, but as part of a much bigger plan. At the end of the skit, the children reminded us:

"There was only one way to be saved from the flood... you had to go through the door of the ark. And there is only one way to be saved from our sin — through Jesus."

That truth still holds today. Whether we're building an ark, saying a prayer, or stepping into the unknown, **Jesus is our Door** — and He is always faithful.

As we head into a summer full of new adventures in Children's Ministry, I carry that message with me — and I hope you do, too. We'll be learning, growing, and trusting in God through summer events and VBS, and I can't wait to see how God continues to move.
