Bond accepts call as Senior Pastor

We are pleased to report that at our Congregational Meeting on Sunday, October 19, following the report and recommendation from our Pastor Nominating Committee, the Reverend Dr. Stuart Bond was called as Pastor/Head of Staff of First Presbyterian Church.

Following that action by the covenant partners, upon the close of the meeting, Pastor Stuart and his wife, Cindy, were welcomed before the assembled Congregation, where they accepted the call with thanks to God and to our Congregation.

Pastor Stuart will be installed as Senior Pastor on Sunday, November 23. Please join us as we gather at 2:30 p.m. in the Welcome Center and break into small groups for a time of corporate prayer, thanking GOD for the gracious gift of Stuart and Cindy Bond joining our covenant family. Those who are able can walk our campus acknowledging the growth we have experienced and praying for wisdom to follow the LORD's guidance in the months and years to come. The installation service will be at 4 p.m.

Formed in March, the committee consisted of David Banner, Alice Caldwell, Charissa Canfield, Jim Dameron, David Lake, Laura Marechal, and Porter Stewart. Blake Taylor also was dedicated to the Church as our Ministry Partner with the Presbytery of South Carolina.

"This was truly a team effort, PNC, Church Staff and Covenant Partners coming together in prayer, seeking God's will in unison," Elder Jim Dameron said.

IN THE PNC'S OWN WORDS

The Pastor Nominating Committee presented its report and recommendation to the congregation. Below are their commentaries regarding their report:

"Interestingly, the PNC having followed the protocols of a search to the "T" or "letter" did not get us

a "call" but did prepare us to confidently "let go" for the Holy Spirit. And, yes, it is hard to explain and, unless you are a part of it, to not think, perhaps, that it

is even a "real" thing. But it is. And it did happen. I totally never thought of Stuart Bond as a candidate throughout the process until what became its ending. Only after I – and the rest of the PNC - let go of a dependency upon our plans and procedures (having already prepared our hearts for spiritual guidance) did the Spirit powerfully facilitate everything else that led to our call to Stuart. And only then, simultaneously, was the same thing happening on Stuart's side of this call. I really, truly, have the faith and confidence in this season that God has heard the many prayers by, for, and on behalf of the PNC and FPC and is equipping all of us, both personally and collectively, to be that church of realized potential and of powerful witness. Let's get to it."

After several months of Bible study, fellowship, prayer, and doing our "due diligence" as we studied ré-

sumés, sermons, faith statements. interviews and discussions together with the other PNC members, we became aware of the fact that our best candidate

was right here with us already at First Presbyterian. That realization, along with a very direct message from God that I received during prayer time, was a eureka moment for me that convinced me that our journey to a recommendation to call Dr. Stuart Bond was a Holy Spirit driven event.

Celebrate the season of gratitude by creating a colorful Thankful decoration.

What you need:

- Construction paper in a variety of fall colors
- Pencil, marker, or crayons
- Yarn, ribbon, or raffia
- Scissors
- Hole punch
- Spray bottle filled with water
- Real leaves (Optional)
- Wooden or plastic beads, 🕥 欣 cereal with holes (Cheerios, Froot Loops, etc.), or any dried pasta with a hole (Optional)

What you do:

- 1. Draw or trace leaf shapes onto construction paper.

Stewardship Season

2026 Stewardship Campaign

We tend to associate the word stewardship with giving money. The truth is that it is about so much more. Rightly understood, stewardship is about giving our time, talent, and treasure in obedience to God's calling on our lives. During the month of November, we will be challenged on the importance of stewardship and our growth as disciples. As part of our worship this month we will hear from our covenant partners about why they give to support the ministry of First Presbyterian Church. On Sunday, November 2, we will kick off our Stewardship Season with a challenge from our Enabling Unit to look to the future. Sunday, November 9, we will have our first of two "Why I Give" testimonies from covenant partner David Banner. November 16 is CDC Sunday, when we will emphasize our church's ministry to children, with a focus on our Child Development Center. This ministry is blessing our community. In fact, several young families have or are joining our church as a result of our ministry to families with young children. Additionally, since stewardship means different things to different people, a panel of covenant partners will share the second "Why I Give" testimony. Our annual Stewardship Emphasis will conclude with Commitment Sunday on November 23, when all covenant partners will bring their pledge cards and place them on the communion table as a part of our worship services.

In the days ahead, all Covenant Partners will receive a letter from our new Senior Pastor, Dr. Stuart Bond, with encouragement regarding the importance of financial stewardship as we look to the future. Later this month, all covenant partners will receive a second letter that will include 2026 Commitment cards, which will allow you to make a pledge to financially support the ministry and mission of First Presbyterian Church. If preferred, Covenant Partners may also make a pledge using REALM or by using the MAKE A PLEDGE link located at the top of the First Presbyterian Church homepage. My prayer during our Stewardship season is that each of us will prayerfully consider how we can follow the call of God found in Malachi 3:10, "Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. Test me in this," says the LORD Almighty, "and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that



you will not have room enough for it."

First Presbyterian Church has been through a season of transition and uncertainty these past two years. With the calling of our new senior pastor/head of staff we are entering a period that is full of opportunity for growth and ministry. Paul's message to the Philippians is a reminder that we, both individually and corporately, need to continue to look forward and follow what God is calling us to be and to do as we move into the future. Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus. (Philippians 3: 13-14). As we look to the future, I want to encourage all covenant partners to look at how God has blessed you and ask Him how He wants you to use your time, talent, and treasure to be a blessing to others through the work of First Presbyterian Church.

A Living Hope

1 PETER, 2 PETER, JUDE

Biology is divided into botany and zoology. It is the study of living things, plants, and animals. Zoa is the Greek word for live. In the New Testament zoa is used seven times to refer to things that God gives life to. It is used four times in 1 Peter: first as a living hope (1Peter 1:3), second as a living word (1 Peter 1:23), and then twice as living stones (I Peter 2:4 and I Peter 2:5). I believe Peter is calling the Church to be a living presence in the world bringing hope to our broken world. This year the Women In Ministry are studying 1 Peter and 2 Peter. I will be using these letters along with Jude to help them with their study and in the Reminder each month. The women chose a study book written by Dr. David Jeremiah, 1 PETER AND 2 PETER, to guide this study.

The New Testament is divided into the four Gospels, ACTS as the history of the early Church, the letters of Paul, the Revelation of Jesus Christ, and the general or catholic (universal) letters. First Peter, 2 Peter, and Jude are included in the general letters.

First Peter calls the recipients of the letter to resist persecution and to stay true to the Good News. This Good News is received from the testimony to Jesus by the Apostles and teachers in the Church. I agree with David Jeremiah that Peter the Apostle wrote both 1 Peter and 2 Peter. Even though he does not include Jude in his study, I will discuss Jude with the second chapter of 2 Peter as it appears this is a commentary on Jude. The main theme of the letters is to provide hope in the midst of living in a Roman world. The Church includes new believers in Jesus as the Messiah. The anticipation of Jesus' return and its delay also produced anxiety and doubt in God's faithfulness. The believers are to live holy lives, yet live in acceptance of Roman authority. They are to endure the persecution of the Roman authority.

Most Jewish Christians and Gentile Christians did not suffer an overall persecution because they were Christians. They may suffer persecution if the Roman authorities realized the believer would not pledge allegiance to Rome and the Roman Empire.

There are several issues that affect our understanding of 1 and 2 Peter. One is the immediate second coming of Jesus was anticipated. Another issue is the difference in faith by each of the two branches of the early Church: Jewish Christians and Gentile Christians. A third issue

is understanding how the Church exists in a culture of unbelievers. This issue continues into our present time in the United States. The early Church in the Roman culture is different than our culture, but there are similarities. This subject will concern us as Citizens of the United States and as believers. David Jeremiah identifies this concern: "Although we live on this earth and seek to be productive members of society, we have to always remember that we are really just pilgrims passing through on our way to heaven." A fourth issue we will be concerned with is understanding the importance of the Christian roots in Jewish culture and religion.

There are many ways to divide 1 Peter into an outline. I would recommend a four-part structure.

- The Holy People of God (Chapters 1:1-2:10) 1.
- 2. Living in a Non-Christian World (Chapters 2:11-3-12)
- 3. Do Not Fear Suffering (Chapters 3:13-4:19)
- 4. Shepherding the Flock of God (Chapter 5:1-14) The greeting of 1 Peter (Chapter 1:1-2) identifies the theme of the rest of the letter. The author is Peter, who identifies himself as "an apostle of Jesus Christ." Peter was well known by the earliest Christians. The letter is written to the "parepidamos," which is translated as pilgrim, exile, stranger, or sojourner. It is a person living in a place not of origin. The believers had been scattered to other parts of the world as persecution of Jewish Christians displaced them from Jerusalem after the stoning of Stephen (Acts 6 and 7). The areas named in 1 Peter were provinces in Northern Galatia. Peter uses a Hebrew concept of being elect as the people of God. The people of God in Peter's eyes are both Jewish Christians transplanted to Northern Galatia and Gentile Christians converted from that region. A trinitarian formula is given for the effect of the witness to Jesus. God meant for them to be included in the people of God. They are made holy (sanctified) by the Spirit for the purpose of obedience. It is the sacrifice of Jesus that enables the recipients of the letter to be the people of God. Two aspects of Early Christianity are extended to these believers, grace and peace. I would extend to all, these gifts from Christ. May grace (the unconditional love of God) be yours so that you may live in peace even when anxiety threatens you.





Benjamin Woods in Concert on November 6

Benjamin Woods will perform a piano recital of works of Beethoven and Brahms at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, November 6, at First Presbyterian Church. The concert is free and open to the public.

As a pianist, Woods has presented many faculty recitals at FMU, chamber music and solo concerts at numerous other colleges and universities and performances at community concert series and festivals. He has been featured as a guest soloist with the Florence Symphony Orchestra and with the Florence Masterworks Choir. Woods also has performed concertos with conductor

John Paul and members of the Mississippi Symphony Orchestra and with Nicholas Smith and the South Carolina Philharmonic Orchestra.

Woods was selected as one of 12 national finalists in the U.S. Information Agency's Artistic Ambassador Competition and one of 10 finalists in the Beethoven International Piano Competition.

Now a professor emeritus of music at FMU, Woods received the dual distinctions of being named one of the FMU board of trustees' Research Scholars and receiving the J. Lorin Mason Distinguished Professor Award.




