



Missions Opportunities


Meet Me in Atlanta!





Continuing September's Trend

Facts & Figures

Our 2025 Ministry Action Plan is approximately \$1.93 million. To carry out the *Ministry Action Plan* set forth by our pastor, program staff and the various ministry units of the Session, we need to receive contributions of \$ 37,320.00 per week. After a challenging time when our weekly giving consistently fell behind the amount needed. Our covenant partners were made aware of the need, and you responded! August was an exciting month as we saw our covenant partners step up in a strong way. We slashed a \$161,000 deficit at the end of July to an approximately \$22,000 deficit at the end of August. We are still seeing strong financial support in September. While still at a deficit, this number is in line with what we expect to see heading into the fall. Traditionally, contributions in the final three months of the year are very strong. My encouragement is that we continue what was started in August and finish strong. The chart below shows a snapshot of our collective giving for the first nine months of 2025.

Stewardship Season

October and November are the months that our staff and leadership begin the planning process for the coming year. It is also the time that we emphasize stewardship and generosity regarding our annual Ministry Action Plan. Our staff and leadership have begun preparing the 2026 Ministry Action Plan. We began using the term **Ministry Action Plan** several years ago because it indicates that there are ministries we want to do and feel that God is calling us to do. So, we "plan" to do them. Those ministries have costs associated and the church relies on the generosity of you, our cove-



nant partners, to provide the necessary resources in addition to various church ministry programs (preschool, children, youth, adults, and an extensive music ministry), the Ministry Action Plan includes support to our missionaries (Emerts, Carol Crom, Gray Scott, and others), as well as providing support to the local agencies (House of Hope, Light House Ministries, Mercy Medicine, Tenacious Grace, A Choice to Make, etc.) As we move into our Stewardship Season, please begin to prepare your hearts and minds as to how you will respond to God's faithfulness and blessings. Tithing provides a regular reminder of your dependence on **God**. In times of prosperity, tithing helps you remember that God is the source of all blessings, and it allows you to demonstrate your gratitude for His care. In difficult times, tithing can motivate you to remember God's faithfulness, and it enables you to demonstrate trust in God to provide for all of your needs.

The Church in a Hostile World

EPHESIANS 6:10-24

The LORD God created the world and loves the world. When we say the world we are including human beings and the entire creation of living things. John 3:16 declares, "God so loved the world. ..." So why is the world hostile to the coming of Jesus? Why does Paul in Ephesians think we need armor to combat the Devil, evil and sin in the world? Human beings have made the wrong decisions and have rebelled against God's wisdom and guidance.

The Church are those people in the world who seek to follow God's way in Jesus. I believe the world will be redeemed and will return to the created state of Genesis, chapter 1, and Eden. In that state it will be even better than Eden (I reference EVEN BETTER THAN EDEN by Nancy Guthrie, which was last year's Women in Ministry study book.). Until then, the Church seeks to partner with God to redeem the world. Ephesians 6:10-20 calls the Christian to struggle with powers beyond human ability. The Church must rely upon the protection of God. Paul calls for Christians to put on the armor of God. The Church can resist the evil power of Satan listed as "the principalities, the powers, world rulers of this present darkness, spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places (Ephesians 6:12)."

The listing of the armor is filled with Old Testament imagery of the final days. The armor of the Roman soldiers is spiritualized to be a model for the Christian. The belt is a sign of preparedness, the truth of God. The breastplate protects the heart and chest. This is the righteous protection of what is vital in living. The shoes are used to march against the enemy. The shield catches the arrows that seek to destroy the life of the wearer. The helmet represents the salvation of the LORD. It is the emblem of belonging to God. The sword is the weapon of offense to attack the enemy. The sword is the word of God representing the Old Testament power to resist and defeat evil. No piece of armor represents prayer, but it is the most important way to defeat evil. Prayer is always done in the Spirit (Ephesians 6:21). All God's people, the followers of Christ, are to be prayed for. Paul asks for prayer. By prayer, the Church is united in the spiritual war against evil.



The final section of Chapter 6 (verses 21-24) includes the introduction of Tychicus. He may have been with Paul when the letter was written. He is the encourager. Paul's final words request peace and grace from God and Iesus Christ to the Church

There seems to be evil acts in our time that defy human understanding. Jesus never advocated violence toward those who crucified him. Certainly in the collaborations between the Jewish Religious Leaders and Roman Empire, we can perceive the same evil Paul describes in Ephesians. It is the combined sin of much human evil that seeks the kill and destroy. As I finish my months of thoughts about God's Word in Ephesians, I pray for the grace to overcome hate and for peace to come to our world. I would urge you to pray for grace and peace. May "grace be with all who love our Lord Jesus Christ with love undying (Ephesians 6:24)."

On September 2, we kicked off the new preschool year jumping into our new Experience Early Learning curriculum focusing on A to Zoo. We also enjoyed Chapel starting back, which is led by Ms. Kaiti, and music led by Mrs. Ann Rodgers. 

First Presbyterian Church will hold a free community concert on Thursday, November 6, with Dr. Benjamin Woods, renowned concert pianist and professor emeritus at Francis Marion University.

Woods studied piano at Lamar University in Beaumont, Texas, and earned his master's degree at Midwestern University in Wichita Falls and doctorate at the University of South Carolina while working at Francis Marion College as an assistant professor of music. His New York debut was made at Carnegie Recital Hall in

1985. Woods served as music director/conductor of the Florence Symphony Orchestra from 1996 to 2002. As pianist, he presented many faculty recitals at Francis Marion University, chamber music and solo concerts at many universities, and performances at community concert series, festivals, and with the Florence Masterworks Choir and Florence Choral Society. 
First Presbyterian is fortunate to have a talented and dedicated church staff. This month, we recognize two of our staff on their employment anniversaries.
