Heartbeat Gala

A Choice to Make Pregnancy Resource Center will have its Heartbeat Gala on Thursday, February 26, at the Southeastern Institute of Manufacturing and Technology. Special guest speaker will be Toni McFadden, founder of the program Relationships Matter and international speaker on the topic of abortion and healthy relationships.



The Heartbeat Gala provides an opportunity for the pro-life community to gather and show support for A Choice to Make Pregnancy Resource Center and its work in the Pee Dee and surrounding areas. A Choice to Make is a Christian, pro-life ministry proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus Christ and providing practical, emotional, and spiritual assistance to women and men who face unplanned pregnancies, promoting alternatives to abortion, post-abortion help, Bible studies, training in parenting skills, and offering support to moms and dads.

Guest speaker Toni McFadden was a scared teenage girl faced with an unplanned pregnancy. She thought the only way out of her darkness was through the doors of an abortion facility.

Author of the book, *Redeemed: My Journey after Abortion*, Toni is a pro-life advocate and international speaker who shares her abortion story of regret with transparency while leaving her listeners with hope.

Doors open at 6 p.m. Program begins at 7 p.m. The SiMT building is located at 1951 Pisgah Road in Florence.

SESSION notes


The session met on Tuesday, January 27, in a stated meeting.

A Look Back at 2025

The Year in Review

Looking back on 2025, First Presbyterian Church has been blessed in many ways. First and foremost is the call and installation of Dr. Stuart Bond as our Senior Pastor. We are grateful to have him and Cindy with us and look forward to how God will use Stuart to lead us in the coming years. In 2025 we faced some financial challenges, but I am happy to report that through the generosity of our covenant partners we ended the year in a good financial position. We were able to fully fund all of our commitments to the local benevolence agencies, we fully supported our missionary partners, and we were able to pay off our debt. God is good! We had a very good response to our 2026 Stewardship campaign, to date 160 of our covenant partners have pledged nearly \$1,280,000 in support of our Ministry Action Plan for 2026. Our ministry action plan includes funding for the various ministry areas of our church (Children, Youth, Adults and Music/Worship). It also includes funding for our church's mission involvement locally, nationally and global. Additionally, the Ministry Action Plan includes funding for fixed costs (utilities, facilities upkeep, salaries, curriculum, etc.) While not nearly as exciting, this part of the Ministry Action plan is important to the ministry of our church by providing the upkeep of the beautiful facilities, sanctuary and musical instruments as well as salaries for our talented staff who faithfully serve our congregation. By your continued financial support of the ministry of First Presbyterian Church, you are directly involved in life changing work, which is what God has called us to be and do as His disciples.

Yielding in Love

1 PETER 3

The study of 1 Peter 3 produces two goals. The first is to define submission. The second is to emphasize the relationship of the church with believers through the suffering of Christ.

The wording of “be subject to or submission” is used over 20 times in the New Testament. The Greek word used is upotasso. It means to place under. I believe the best definition is “a voluntary yielding in love.” This means the individual chooses to submit to some person as an act of love. 1 Peter uses the word to describe how husbands and wives are to relate to one another. Jesus defines submission with his own life. Jesus submits to God, his Father, by volunteering in love to God and all of humanity, by yielding to violence, because he loves those who murder him. This is a great mystery of Jesus’ work on the cross as his death brings meaning to forgiving human sin. My basic understanding of sin is to ignore God and the teaching of Jesus. We willingly submit to God and Jesus because we realize this is the best way to live. Again, in our studies, I reference the sin of idolatry as the reason Jesus is crucified.

1 Peter 3:1-12 defines God’s will for wives, husbands, and the Church. I assume from the context of the writing in 1 Peter 3:1 and the understanding of the Roman culture of the first century, that women were considered to be of lower authority to men. The Church in Northern Galatia may have a greater population of women believers than male. If a wife lived in a Christ-like way, then she may influence her husband to follow Christ (1 Peter 3:1-2). Sarah is used to illustrate the example of submission.

In one verse Peter gives the characteristics of a Christian husband: “dwell with them” (wives) “with understanding, giving honor to the wife … and as being heirs together (1 Peter 3:7).” In a controversial statement the wife is called the “weaker vessel.” This has caused debate in the Church. I believe this statement refers to the prohibition of domestic abuse in the home. A husband or wife is not allowed to use violence to ensure submission. This is a sin that causes great harm to the marriage relationship. In 1 Peter 3:8, there is a definition of submission: “having compassion for one another … tenderhearted … courteous, not returning evil.”

The topic of the letter changes at 1 Peter 3:13 to unwanted and righteous suffering. The attitude of Jesus and his submission to suffering on the cross illustrates how Christians are to respond to their own suffering. A slave, wife, husband, or disciple are to accept abuse from another person without the retaliation of violence. The slave had no choice but to accept abuse. The spouse does have a choice in our society to leave the situation. The example of Christ is given in 1 Peter 3:18. Jesus destroys the will to violence by allowing himself to be murdered innocently. His example corrects and saves our need for revenge. Jesus’ salvation calls disciples to ignore the temptation to resort to revenge for wrongdoing.

This is a paradox of life on earth. How does Jesus’ suffering and death bring life to humanity? How does our suffering witness to our ability to help others who are suffering? The answer lies in God raising Jesus to life in the resurrection. All humans have the opportunity to choose to be resurrected and defeat death and suffering. Eternal life is a promise of God to all who believe that God overcomes death and sin in the resurrection of Jesus.

David Jeremiah in 1 and 2 PETER lists three purposes of suffering. The first purpose of human suffering for our faith brings understanding to others who are suffering. To overcome suffering with faith in Christ is to be an example of dealing with suffering in patience waiting for the healing from God. The second purpose is the response to suffering indicates that the strength of faith overcomes doubt and fear of death. Faith in Christ realizes death is defeated. The third purpose is all humans have blessings, troubles, and suffering. To suffer is to be human in a fallen state away from God. Faith in Jesus reconciles humans to God. The life promised beyond earthly existence exceeds expectations.

Paul exclaims in Philippians 1:21: “for to me, to live is Christ, and to die is gain.” So, we live day by day following Jesus, praying for spiritual gifts to witness and to rejoice in God’s presence even when we suffer. In this living we are witnesses to the power of Jesus’ death and resurrection. Our prayer becomes one of faith: “O LORD, help me to love each one I meet and respond to evil with good.”

Dear Church Family,

February often draws our attention to love, and it reminds me that the deepest kind of love is the one we practice every day.


In Children's Ministry, I see this love lived out in small but powerful ways — a kind word to a friend, a prayer offered for someone else, a helping hand without being asked.


